1. CALL TO ORDER

The Regular Meeting was called to order at 6:59 P.M. by Chairman Terry Smith.

2. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF THE FEBRUARY 17, 2016 REGULAR MEETING

MOTION: to approve the Minutes of the February 17, 2016 Regular Meeting. Made by Terry Smith, seconded by Mark Capodanno. Unanimous Approval

3. DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Dan Norton, Director of Public Works, reviewed his Director's Report with the Commission. He stated that it was a good winter. They had 12 responses to slippery road conditions with a total snow accumulation of 28.9" as opposed the average of 14. , responses and 43" of snow. He purchased 1,845 tons of treated salt and 9,000 gallons of ice-B-Gone. While normally sand/salt mix is used out of the reserve, it was not necessary to do so this season. Three skids of sidewalk Traction/Melt were also utilized as opposed to the average of 4. Street sweeping will start around the first week of May along with asphalt and curb repairs. He anticipates paving Watertown Road and Ravenwood Drive in the near future. The LED lighting upgrades that Peter has been

involved with will be wrapped up shortly. Spring cleaning has begun within the buildings while the clean-up of the Little League Field, MRA and three parks is underway. He is hoping to have Jack Hanley of ESCO come to speak to this Commission regarding the possibility of acquiring the Town's streetlights and converting them to LED. There are many options to choose from and doing so would prove to be cost effective.

Chairman Smith stated that he would like to see a proposal prior to Mr. Hanley coming before this Commission.

Dan Norton, Director of Public Works informed the Commission that the fuel tanks have been designed as the old tanks need to be removed by November of 2017.
